Mary Rasenberger is an attorney specializing in copyright law. Until recently, she was Senior Policy Advisor for Public Policy and Programs in the Office of Strategic Initiatives of the Library of Congress where she advised on public policy issues, including copyright and other legal issues, including serving as secretary and administrator for the Section 108 Study Group and overseeing other reports and recommendations to advance Congressional and public support for digital collection and preservation programs and related copyright issues. Prior to that position, Mary served as Program Director of NDIIPP, an initiative led by the Library of Congress to create a national strategy for the long term preservation of digital content; Policy Advisor for Special Programs for the U.S. Copyright Office where she oversaw special programs and worked on policy matters, including launching the Section 108 Study Group and the orphan works and other legislative initiatives; and Policy Planning Advisor for the Office of Policy and International Affairs of the Copyright Office where she worked on international matters including treaty negotiations and domestic copyright policy issues. Prior to working at the Copyright Office, Mary was Of Counsel to the Technologies Transactions Group at Morrison & Foerster and Counsel in the Intellectual Property and Technology practice group at Skadden, Arps, Slate Meagher & Flom. Mary is a graduate of Harvard Law School and a former trustee and D.C. Chapter chair of the Copyright Society of the U.S.A.
