



Michael Robinson joined the Motion Picture Association of America as Vice President and Director of United States Anti-Piracy Operations in January 2006 following a distinguished law enforcement and public service career that spanned four decades.

Rising through the ranks of the Michigan State Police, Mr. Robinson was appointed Director of the agency by Governor John Engler in 1991. As Director of the Michigan State Police, he developed an international reputation as an innovative law enforcement leader. He was elected president of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, and served as chairman of a U.S. Department of Justice Federal Advisory Committee charged with integrating law enforcement information systems. Mr. Robinson also served on the U.S. Presidential Export Council, Sub-Committee on Encryption export Control.

Following the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, Mr. Robinson joined a team of executives tasked with building the new Transportation Security Administration. As TSA's first Assistant Administrator for Aviation Operations, Mr. Robinson oversaw the deployment of over 55,000 Transportation Security Officers to the nation's 429 commercial airports, transitioned the Civil Aviation Security Program from the FAA to the TSA, and directed the efforts of the Federal Air Marshals Service.

As Vice President and Director of the U.S. Anti-Piracy Operation for the Motion Picture Association of America, Mr. Robinson leads anti-piracy investigations and countermeasures for the associations member studios; Disney, Fox, Paramount, NBC-Universal, Sony, and Warner Brothers.
